August Speaker: Dr. Erin Perry Associate Professor of Agriculture, SIU Carbondale

Management of Working Dog Hygiene in the Field



Have you seen the canine partners on the news as they search disaster areas and have you had questions? The back story has many aspects that will surprise you. In this presentation, Dr. Erin Perry will focus on the challenges and observations of the working canines and their human teams in the Champlain Towers building collapse in Florida. Dr. Perry has more than 19 years of experience with working canines and health issues related to deployment of canines in emergencies. She works with Missouri Task Force One and the Federal

Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). Dr. Perry and canine partners have deployed to numerous disasters including Hurricane Katrina, Hurricane Sandy, Joplin Tornado, Colorado Flooding, and Hurricane Harvey. When exposed to potentially life threatening chemicals, pathogens, and toxins, the human partner can shed their clothes, but the canines can't.

Dr. Perry has a unique perspective and passion focused on keeping teams safe as they work, often in very unique environments without resources. Her leading research findings are appropriate for family pets, service dogs, and military as well. A leading expert in many areas, she is currently investigating innovative uses of canine olfaction in detecting various threats to humans, including the dangerous and costly toxins in agricultural fields.

We will read Isaac Dinesen's "Babette's Feast," John Cheever's "The Swimmer," Andre Dubus's "Killings," Daphne DuMaurier's "The Birds," and Annie Proulx's "Brokeback Mountain," and watch and discuss the films made thereof, all of which have the same title as the story except Dubus's, which becomes "In the Bedroom." All the films are available on various streaming services and I'll happily email the stories to everyone. If you do not have access to the films, let me know.

A Brief History of Colonial America (to 1763)

The class is a surface exploration of the social, ideological, economic, and political developments in the British North American colonies from the end of the 16th century to the middle of the 18th century. It begins with the first contact between indigenous and colonizing cultures and ends on the eve of the American Revolution. It will be a series of informal lectures/discussions that examine important historical events central to the creation of the American nation: the origins of racism and slavery, the maturity of capitalism and class conflict, and the creation of religious and social identities. Thursday

The Status of Film and Television in the Age of Digital Streaming

Instructor: Walter Metz

September 15-October 13 1:30 - 3:30 pm

This course argues that the tectonic shift in the delivery of audio-visual film and television content via streaming platforms mandates a corollary shift in film and television criticism. The instructor will deliver case studies of these transitions. Here are some examples: Is Apple's Ted Lasso simply a "television sitcom?" Does Curb Your Enthusiasm presented on HBO Max provide any different audience experience than watching Seinfeld on NBC or Curb in its early seasons on HBO, formerly a cable premium channel? Does it matter whether natural history content—such as My Octopus Teacher—is delivered via Netflix or PBS Nature or BBC/Discover? Was the shift to streaming culture inevitable, or did the pandemic seal the fate of in-person movie attendance? Disney's special holiday presentation of a canned performance of Hamilton shot years before as a "media event" will serve as one of the case studies. Students will read relevant critical theory in film, television, and media studies and present work on streaming case studies of interest to them.
